CONTENT SPECIALIZATION: (30 hours)

Students choose appropriate coursework in consultation with the student's advisory committee based on individual needs, academic and professional background, and goals. Some courses selected may be outside the Department of Family Sciences.

Application of Course Credit to Graduate Degrees in Family Studies: The Family Studies graduate programs do not accept course work credit for courses accomplished before admission to the program. This standard means that courses taken as “non-degree seeking” or while in a different graduate major cannot be applied to the graduate degree of M.S. or Ph.D.

After admission to the Ph.D. program, a student may submit transcript(s) from a Master’s degree program for consideration for application toward the doctorate. Only courses that were taken as part of a completed M.S. degree will be considered. (This is commonly called credits from an “intact Master’s.”)

Assignment of Advisors, Major Professor, and Degree Plan Committee: Upon acceptance to the doctoral program, a student will be assigned to an initial advisor who will assist in course selection for the first 18 hours. Following successful completion of the First Year Qualifying Exam, the student may request assignment to a permanent advisor (Major Professor). That advisor and the student will select and invite a Degree Plan Committee. Students are required to have on their degree plan committee a minimum of two faculty members from their program component. After the successful completion of the comprehensive examination, the student will invite three faculty members to serve on the Dissertation Committee.

All degree plans must comply with graduate school requirements as presented in the catalog. At a minimum, programs must consist of 90 graduate credit hours, which include 30 hours of research coursework (dissertation, research methods, statistics, etc.). The university-required research tools (12 hours) are included in the minimum 90 graduate credit hours.

First Year Qualifying Examination: A set of objective tests will be offered each academic year and must be successfully passed by Family Studies doctoral students before completion of 18 hours of course work. The examination consists of objective tests in the areas of human development, family theories, research methodology, and statistics. All tests must be completed in one 4-hour sitting. An acceptable passing score is required for each test. One re-take is allowed. All scores will be forwarded to an advisory committee for program continuation approval.

Comprehensive Exams: Before advancing to candidacy, doctoral students must successfully complete written and oral comprehensive exams as outlined in the Graduate Catalog.

Grades: No grade below B will count toward the degree. The Advisor or Major Professor may call for a review of the student’s transcript if the student earns an F in any course or more than one grade below B. Doctoral students are expected to promptly notify the Advisor or Major Professor about grades other than A or B.

Research Tools: Research tools requirements are included in the 90 hours required for Family Studies doctoral degrees. The approved research tools are FS 5193 Statistics for Research in Family Sciences, FS 6693 Advanced Quantitative Research Methods, FS 6793 Advanced Qualitative Research Methods, and FS 6873 Applied Multivariate Statistics for Family Science (Effective Jan. 25, 2011).

Seminars: Doctoral students in Family Studies are required to attend at least 3 seminars each calendar year. Opportunities are listed on the department website.
