

TWU graduate named National Library of Medicine Associate Fellow



Sept. 4, 2007 - HOUSTON —
Emily Vardell, an August 2007
Texas Woman's University
graduate, has been appointed
a National Library of Medicine
Associate Fellow for 2007-08.
Ms. Vardell is the daughter of
Dr. Sylvia Vardell, professor of

library sciences on TWU's Denton campus, and Dr.
Russell Vardell of Grand Prairie. She graduated from
South Grand Prairie High School in 2001 and from
Wellesley College in 2005. She earned her master of
library science degree in August from the TWU Institute
of Health Sciences-Houston Center.

The NLM Associate Fellowship Program is a one-year
postgraduate training fellowship at the National Library
of Medicine in Bethesda, MD. The program, which
includes a \$46,041 stipend, is designed to prepare
librarians for future leadership roles in health sciences
libraries and in health services research. NLM Associate
Fellows are selected from a nationwide pool of
applicants. Approximately seven associate fellows are
appointed each year.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to learn about the
best health science information resources from the
people who actually design them," Ms. Vardell said.

The first half of the program, which begins in
September, includes training in all components of the

Interview with Emily Vardell, SLIS Alumna & NLM Fellowship Award Winner

How would you describe your experience at the
National Library of Medicine?

It's been an amazing experience. The associates are
treated like royalty here! We have been introduced to
and have mingled with the celebrities of the medical
librarianship profession! It is such an honor to be
singled out as someone deserving of such attention and
close guardianship. The staff at NLM values what the
associates bring to the library and I am excited about
having the opportunity to give back.

What areas have you focused on so far in the
fellowship program, or what have you learned about?

The Fellowship year is a two-part program. The first
part of the program, in which all divisions of the library
come to the associates and discuss their work, is about
to come to a close. The second part, which begins in
February, allows us to complete projects within
different areas of the library. As part of the curriculum
phase, I have heard from experts in all parts of the
library from handling valuable and aging books in the
History of Medicine Division to hearing about the latest
databases and Internet resources from the Lister Hill
Center.

NLM's operations, including administration, preservation, education and training of biomedical information professionals, consumer health information and more. The latter half of the program focuses on individualized projects related to the study, research and evaluation of NLM programs and services.

"I plan to become a leader in the health information field," Ms. Vardell said. "With my focused coursework at TWU, and this Fellowship, I feel confident that I will have a solid foundation that will help me realize this goal."

Ms. Vardell was encouraged to apply for the NLM Fellowship by her adviser, Dr. Jeffrey Huber, professor of library sciences at TWU's Houston Center.

"Emily is genuinely interested in health sciences librarianship, and has repeatedly demonstrated that she is diligent, hard-working and willing to 'go the extra mile,'" Dr. Huber said.

Ms. Vardell has spent the past two years in Vienna, Austria, on a Fulbright Grant, which she was awarded to study the Austrian health care system and work as an English-language teaching assistant in Austrian high schools.

SLIS Accreditation News

In July 2007, the American Library Association, Committee on Accreditation, informed TWU SLIS of its decision, following the accreditation review, to reaccredit our master's degree programs.

TWU SLIS has been released from three of the four major areas of concern originally raised during the school's accreditation review in 2003. COA expresses its continuing concern in one area of the Standards related to data collection and implementation of planning. For this reason, COA has continued our accreditation with condition, and has given the school three years to address this particular concern. The school will prepare for a progress review in spring 2010.

The accreditation of the master's programs at TWU SLIS remains intact. The continuing progress review has no affect on the degree students receive, or the quality of TWU SLIS graduates.

Are you focusing on any specific area of medical/health sciences librarianship?

We are encouraged to keep an open mind and explore many areas within the field. I am particularly interested in Informatics and Public Health. I hope to combine my science background with my library degree and my interest in serving the public in my future career.

2007 Lazerow Lecture and SLIS Fall Forum



The annual Lazerow Lecture was held on Friday, October 5, 2007, in conjunction with the SLIS Fall Forum on Saturday, October 6, 2007. On Friday, Dr. Brenda Dervin of Ohio

State University delivered the Lazerow Lecture, entitled "Myths about Recalcitrant and Uppity Users by Whatever Names They Are Called - Audiences, Patients, Patrons, Citizens ...," which was followed by a reception.

On Saturday, the Fall Forum began with a welcome session by Dr. Ling Hwey Jeng and the introduction of SLIS faculty and staff members. Students had the opportunity to attend up to six sessions throughout the day, with topics geared for new students, continuing students and all students.

Presentations in the first session included "Distance Education Library Resources," by TWU Distance Education Librarian, Stephany Compton; "Becoming a Library Professional: Insights from Library Managers on Interviewing and Beyond," with Sherilyn Bird, Director of TWU Libraries, Monique Franklin of Harris County (TX) Public Library, and Dr. Lorie Bruns, Director of Library Services for Arlington (TX) ISD; and "Overcoming the Perils of Plagiarism: A Librarian's Plan of Action," by Antoinette Nelson, Science & Engineering Library Branch Manager, University of Texas at Arlington.

Presentations in the second session included "Librarians in Special Places," with Ted Wanner of TLA, Regina Lee of Mary Kay Cosmetics, and Robert Watkins of Amigos Library Services; "Final Portfolio Tips," by Dr. Keith Swigger of TWU SLIS; and "Graduation Guidelines," by Dr. Ruth Johnson, Associate Dean of the TWU Graduate

School.

The third session included presentations on the Practicum, by Ms. MaryAnn Kitchens, Practicum Coordinator for TWU SLIS; School Librarian Certification issues, with Dr. Janet Hilbun of TWU SLIS; and "View from the Top: A Library Administrators' Roundtable," with Melody Kelly, Associate Dean of Libraries at the University of North Texas, Rebecca Hubbard of Dallas Public Library, and Debra Gibson, Coordinator of the Northeast Texas Library System (NETLS).

Other sessions included "Tips for Surviving the MLS from Experienced Students," with TWU SLIS Graduate Assistants, Taylor Lincecum and Gayle Gordon, and student, Bonnie Fitzpatrick; "Q&A with the Director," with SLIS Director, Dr. Ling Hwey Jeng; and "Practicum Questions and Answers," with Ms. MaryAnn Kitchens.

Students also had the opportunity to take a tour of the Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey Library with library staff, tour the TWU campus, and meet faculty members in their offices. A reception for SLIS doctoral students was held at the end of the day.

PELSC Grant Update

Thirty public library workers from across the State of Texas began the Professional Education for Librarians in Small Communities (PELSC) program in January 2008. The cohort of 30 students in this IMLS-funded program attended a three-day orientation on the TWU Denton campus on January 18-20.

The PELSC cohort students work in Texas public libraries serving communities of 25,000 or less. Cohort members will take two courses each semester, with graduation expected in December 2009. In addition to the courses, cohort members will have mentors, attend the TLA annual conferences in 2008, 2009 and 2010, and attend a leadership institute.

Dr. Robert Martin, Professor and Lillian Bradshaw Endowed Chair in the School of Library and Information Studies, and Dr. Ling Hwey Jeng, Director of SLIS, are principal investigators on the project. A Laura Bush 21st Century Librarians IMLS grant of \$691,323 helps fund this project. In addition, the Tocker Foundation provided a second grant of \$38,400. Other partners have joined together in support this project, including the Texas Library Association and the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. The PELSC Advisory Board includes Sue Dear of Jasper Public Library, Dale Fleeger of Weatherford Public Library, Tina Hager of Little Elm Public Library, Donna Littlejohn of Amarillo Public Library, Dawn Vogler of the Texas State Library, Ted Wanner of the Texas Library Association and Dr. Robert Martin.

Beginning after the IMLS grant announcements in June, PELSC project staff traveled across Texas to

recruit students for the cohort. In addition to Dr. Martin and Dr. Jeng, Dr. Janine Golden (SLIS faculty member), Ms. MaryAnn Kitchens (SLIS Practicum and Recruitment Coordinator) Ms. Sarah Merrill (SLIS Assessment Officer), and Ms. Cherri Shelnutt (SLIS Graduate Assistant for the PELSC project) visited meetings for Texas library systems and TLA districts.

Orientation was held in Denton on January 18-20, 2008. Cohort members met on campus Friday, January 18, for an introductory session to meet each other, the TWU SLIS faculty and the project team. That evening, everyone gathered for a reception and dinner to further meet and network. Special thanks to Advisory Board members Tina Hager and Dawn Vogler for attending the reception and dinner.

On Saturday morning, the cohort students had orientation sessions about Blackboard and the TWU library. After lunch, a course introduction was held on the TWU campus. That evening, the cohort joined project team members for dinner in Denton. Sunday after breakfast, the group met for one more class session and then returned home.

Orientation was a wonderful opportunity for cohort members to meet each other, network and begin to build a community that will now communicate in the virtual world. A special thanks to all of the PELSC partners, the Advisory Board and everyone who has worked on the PELSC project. It will be a great experience for all involved.
