MOST OF HOUSTON STAFF RETURNS TO WORK AFTER FLOOD

The majority of the staff at TWU's Houston Center returned to work Monday, July 2 after Tropical Storm Allison caused an estimated \$3 million in damage to the center. Campus officials report that the power is back and telephone communications are restored but not all of the computers are working.

Classes are scheduled to return to the Houston campus from alternate locations on Thursday, July 5. All university offices will be closed Wednesday, July 4 for the holiday.

Dr. Ann Stuart, TWU chancellor and president, said work crews from Denton have been in Houston since the weekend of the flood and have gone above and beyond the call of duty. TWU Denton campus individuals who went to Houston to help include Alan Nelson, interim director of facilities management; Dr. Brenda Floyd, vice president for finance and administration; Dr. Wilkes Berry, associate provost; Dr. Mike Droge, dean of graduate studies and research; Dr. Carolyn Gunning, dean of the college of nursing; and Nancy Murphy-Chadwick, director of university housing. They have worked closely with Houston faculty and associate deans, as well as with housing, facilities and other personnel to minimize the inevitable disruption caused by the flood.

Every student who was living in a TWU residence hall at the Houston Center has been offered housing at the University of Houston for the remainder of Summer I and Summer II at no additional cost, said Dr. Richard Nicholas, vice president of student life. Students who don't take the offer can get a full refund.

Dr. Nicholas said officials have not yet determined when the Houston residence halls can re-open, and they are exploring alternatives for fall should that be necessary.
