TWU RECOGNIZES DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI

Texas Woman's University and the TWU Former Students Association will recognize four distinguished alumni during Honors Convocation ceremonies April 15 and at an awards luncheon on April 17. The honorees are Dr. Margaret L. Bogle of Little Rock, Ark., Dr. Janie H. Humphries of Ruston, La., Virginia "Ginger" Purdy of San Antonio and Dr. Glenda B. Simmons of Denton.

Convocation is at 10 a.m. April 15 in the Margo Jones Performance Hall. The Distinguished Alumni Awards Luncheon is at 11:30 a.m. April 17 in the southeast ballroom of Hubbard Hall. Dr. Bogle has a history of outstanding work in the field of community and pediatric nutrition that spans more than 48 years. She earned her Ph.D. in nutrition science at TWU in 1989. She currently is an associate professor at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences and executive director of the Lower Mississippi Delta Nutrition Intervention Research Initiative.

Dr. Humphries is an assertive leader who has had exceptional success working with parents, students and professionals. She is a 1964 TWU home economics graduate and since 1995 she has held the position of McGehee Professor of Early Childhood Education, School of Human Ecology, Louisiana Tech University.

Ms. Purdy is a 1948 graduate of TWU with more than 35 years' experience in advertising and public relations. Her career started as a fashion artist and she later became advertising manager of the Texas/New Mexico Division of Dillard's Department Stores. In 1976, she went into business for herself. Ms. Purdy is the founding president of Network Power/Texas, a non-profit corporation that promotes equity and self-sufficiency for women through educational programs and services.

Dr. Simmons received her baccalaureate and master's degrees at TWU (1961, 1962). She served as TWU's dean of students and vice president for student life for 14 years and was a member of the business and economics faculty for 22 years. On her retirement, she was

named vice president emeritus, the only person ever to hold such a title at TWU. Since her retirement, she has served as a member of the TWU Foundation Board, as a board member of Friends of the Family, and has been actively involved as a volunteer with Ann's Haven Hospice, the RSVP tutoring program and numerous other community social service agencies. She has been a member of the TWU Former Students Association and served as the 2003 homecoming chairperson.

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TWU HOSTS CULTURAL CONNECTIONS CONFERENCE SERIES

The Office of Intercultural Services is hosting the Cultural Connection Conference Series (CCCS), featuring the 3rd Annual African American Women's Student Leadership Conference (AAWSLC) on March 27 and the Latina Leadership Conference (LLC) on April 2.

Both events are dedicated to promoting leadership, cultural awareness and celebrating diversity within the community through education, intense and honest dialogue and networking. Both conferences will be held in the Student Center.

Dr. Deleso Alford Washington, a gender law attorney from Washington, D.C., will be the keynote speaker for AAWSLC. Her area of focus is the evolving legal theory of intersectionality, which addresses the particularized discrimination faced by women of color due to race, sex and class. She is interested in the application of intersectional discrimination in the workplace, both internationally and domestically.

Dallas City Council member Dr. Elba García will be the featured speaker for the Latina Leadership Conference. She is the spokesperson for the American Cancer Society for Latin women. As a council member, Dr. García serves on the city of Dallas' Arts, Education and Libraries Committee, the Minority and Municipal Affairs Committee and is vice-chair of the Health, Human and Youth Services Committee.

Other presenters at the AAWSLC include Dr. Kevin Washington of RAM Enterprises, presenting a session titled "Realizing the Power of Divine Womanhood." Dr. Pamela Nzingha Hill of *African American News & Issues* will present "Peace Power and Blessings."
