JOYCE THOMPSON MEMORIAL LECTURE SCHEDULED

Author Joyce Gibson Roach will offer perspective on small-town life for women in West Texas with her presentation “Chronicles of Toad” at the 15th Annual Joyce Thompson Memorial Lecture, Nov. 2, at Texas Woman’s University.

The lecture will begin at 2:30 p.m. on the third floor of the Administration and Conference Tower. Admission is free and the event is open to the public. For more information, call 8-1-2665.

Roach is a three-time Spur Award winner from the Western Writers of America for her nonfiction, short nonfiction and short-fiction works. She also received the Carr P. Collins prize for nonfiction from the Texas Institute of Letters for “Eats: A Folk History of Texas Foods” with co-author Ernestine Sewell Linck. Her “Chronicles of Toad” are included in “Writing on the Wind: An Anthology of West Texas Women Writers” published in 2005 by Texas Tech Press.

The Joyce Thompson Lecture is an annual event honoring the memory of Dr. Joyce Thompson, professor of English, who served as a member of the TWU faculty from 1977 until her death in 1992 at the age of 48. She was the founder of the Women and American Literature and the Ethnic Literature courses at TWU. Author of more than 30 published works, Dr. Thompson’s major writings included “Marking A Trail: A History of the Texas Woman’s University,” “Texas Women: The Myth/The Reality” and “Ladies’ Firsts: A Miscellany.”

Dr. Pamela Youngblood, TWU professor of music, said “Songs for Women’s Voices” originally was written with only piano accompaniment, but added that Walker has created orchestral accompaniment for the piece and will perform it with the TWU Concert Choir and instrumental ensemble. The performance will mark the Texas premiere of the orchestrated piece.

The gala concert also will include performances by TWU chamber singers and soloists, and will feature the Woodrow Wilson All-Star Choir in the composer’s “23rd Psalm” and “Crossing the Bar.”

Walker, a graduate of Brown University and the Hartt School of Music, holds bachelor’s, master’s and doctoral degrees in music composition. She taught at Hartt, the Oberlin College Conservatory and the Hartford Conservatory before becoming a full-time composer in 1982. She lives on a farm in Braintree, Vt., and is a founder of the Vermont Composers Guild. She received the “Lifetime Achievement Award” from the Vermont Arts Council in the year 2000.

Funding for the composer-in-residence event is provided in part by the Greater Denton Arts Council, the Arts Guild of Denton, the Texas Commission on the Arts, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Texas Woman’s University School of the Arts.
