TWU REGENTS APPROVE FACULTY PROMOTIONS, TENURE

The Texas Woman's University Board of Regents recently approved promotions and tenure recommendations at its quarterly meeting held June 30.

Associate Professors Dr. **Mark Britt** (chemistry/physics), Dr. **Ellina Grigorieva** (mathematics/computer science) and Dr. **Young-Hoo Kwon** (kinesiology) were awarded tenure. **Sharon Benge**, director of the TWU drama department, was promoted to professor and received tenure.

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PARTNERSHIP AIMED AT ENCOURAGING MATH SKILLS

High school seniors can take college algebra and receive high school and college credit through a partnership between Denton Independent School District and North Texas Central College, the University of North Texas and Texas Woman's University.

Called "On the MARC – Math Advancement and Readiness Collaborative," the partnership was formed to encourage students to keep up their math skills during their senior year and help them perform better at the college level.

Beginning in August, seniors enrolled in the program can take the class on their high school campus through NCTC or enroll in courses on the UNT and TWU campuses.

Tuition costs will be \$216 at NCTC; \$219 plus fees for TWU; and \$421.50 plus fees at UNT. The college and universities are covering the instructional expenses, so there is no cost to DISD for this project.

Research shows that not having to take math in the senior year of high school is a primary reason students are not ready for college-level math courses.

"Many college freshmen are required, then, to enroll in one or more developmental math courses to improve their skills before they can take college algebra, a core course for most degree plans," said Dr. Lee Ann Nutt, provost for NCTC-Corinth campus.

Denton ISD tested 762 high school juniors enrolled in Algebra II by using a placement exam developed by TWU. Students who made a qualifying score were then approved to pursue dual credit courses at the three area higher education institutions.

If a student did not qualify for dual credit, he or she can take Algebra III at the high school in the fall. They may be eligible in the spring 2007 semester for a dual math credit course, school officials said.

All three participating higher education institutions are in the Denton ISD.

“The level of cooperation between the school district and the higher education institutions is remarkable,” Dr. Nutt said. “Denton is fortunate to have an educational system that works together to make transitions between high school and college as smooth and successful as possible.”

“TWU is happy to be part of this wonderful project,” said Dr. Don Edwards, associate dean for the College of Arts and Sciences at TWU. “I believe that we will see a great improvement in student performance in math courses and on math assessments as a result of this partnership.”
