LIBBA BRAY RETURNS TO DENTON FOR JOYCE THOMPSON LECTURE

Bestselling author and former Denton resident Libba Bray is the guest speaker for the 2007 Joyce Thompson Memorial Lecture at Texas Woman's University. The event, which is free and open to the public, is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 6 in the Multipurpose Classroom and Laboratory (MCL) Auditorium on TWU's Denton campus.

Ms. Bray's books *A Great and Terrible Beauty* and *Rebel Angels* have been named to the *New York Times* bestseller list. She also has contributed short stories to the anthologies *21 Proms*, *Restless Dead* and *Up All Night* (HarperCollins, spring 2008). Her third novel in the Gemma Doyle trilogy, *The Sweet Far Thing*, will be published by Delacorte in December 2007.

Ms. Bray's books have been named to the American Library Association's Best Books for Young Adults and the Texas Library Association's Tayshas Reading List. She received the NAIBA (New Atlantic Independent Bookseller Association) Young Adult Book of the Year Award in 2005 and 2006, and was the recipient of the 2007 Iowa High School Book Award. Her plays have been produced in Dallas, Houston, Austin, Los Angeles and New York City, and the movie rights to her trilogy have been optioned by Icon Productions.

Ms. Bray grew up in Denton and, as a student, was active in the Denton Community Theater. She is the daughter of Nancy Bray of Denton, a TWU master of arts graduate and a distinguished teacher who retired from the Denton Independent School District after many years of teaching at Strickland Middle School and Ryan High School.

The 2007 Joyce Thompson Memorial Lecture is hosted by the Friends of the TWU Library. The lecture series highlights American literature and culture and honors the memory of Dr. Joyce Thompson, TWU professor of English from 1975 to 1992.

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TWU DRAMA PRESENTS ‘ALICE IN WONDERLAND’ WITH PUPPETS

The Texas Woman’s University drama program puts a new twist on a classic tale with an adaptation of “Alice in Wonderland” that features puppets and music.

Performances will be at 4 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 8; at 8 p.m. Friday, Nov. 9; at 2 and 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 10; and at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 11. All performances will take place in the Redbud Theatre Complex, located on the northwest side of historic Hubbard Hall on TWU’s Denton campus. Tickets are \$10 for children, students and seniors and \$12 for adults. For reservations or more information, call the TWU box office at 81-2020.

Based on Lewis Carroll’s *Alice’s Adventures in Wonderland*, this version follows Alice (portrayed by Brandianne Kramer of Haltom City) down the rabbit hole and into a world where she encounters puppets in the roles of the Mad Hatter, the Caterpillar and more. Cast and crew will build more than 70 puppets to make Carroll’s whimsical tale come alive on stage.

The TWU performance is only the third production of the adaptation by co-creators Lake Simons and John Dyer, both of New York. The first performance was at Fort Worth’s Hip Pocket Theatre, and it most recently was performed off-Broadway at the HERE Arts Center in New York City. Ms. Simons is the director/choreographer for the production, and Mr. Dyer composed the music.

Professional artist Nikki DeShae Smith will design the lighting, and TWU master’s degree candidate William Walker will design and create the Edwardian costumes for the production. Crystal Holub of Irving serves as stage manager, and Christina Williams is the assistant to the director.
