## **TWU NAMES KAY CLAYTON AS NEW PROVOST**

DENTON/DALLAS/HOUSTON — Continuing to grow enrollment and expanding academic programs to meet the needs of the citizens of Texas are the priorities of new Texas Woman's University Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Kay Clayton. A TWU alumna, Dr. Clayton will begin her duties at TWU on July 1.

"I want to build on TWU's foundation of excellence and provide the leadership to expand those programs that can, and should, grow and also to identify new areas for program development to meet the needs of the citizens of Texas," Dr. Clayton said. "The challenge, as always, will be finding the resources to enable this growth and expansion to happen."

"TWU is a wonderful university with many important programs," she added. "By working together and striving for excellence, we – the faculty, students, staff, and administration – can reach a new level of achievement. The future of the university is very bright indeed, and I am excited to be a part of the leadership team."

Dr. Clayton currently is provost and vice president for academic affairs at Texas A&M University-Kingsville. Her experience includes more than 12 years of senior administrative duties at A&M-Kingsville, including professor and chair of the department of human sciences. At the national level, she has recent experience with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) accreditation process, and she continues to provide leadership training to new provosts for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

"Dr. Clayton is the right choice to lead us into the future," said TWU President and Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart. "Our enrollment has grown tremendously; we are well into implementing our strategic plans, and we are preparing to build a new Dallas campus. Dr. Clayton will be an integral part of our success during this dynamic time."

Dr. Clayton earned her Ph.D. in education from TWU. She received her master's degree in education from Our Lady of the Lake University in San Antonio and her bachelor's degree from Sam Houston State University. She replaces current TWU Provost Dr. Carolyn Gunning, who is retiring at the end of the spring semester.

"I will work very hard to lead the academic units in achieving the highest of standards in

teaching, research and service so that we can continue to make significant and meaningful contributions to our society through higher education,” Dr. Clayton said.

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## **TWU RECEIVES \$2.2 MILLION FROM DEIKER ESTATE**

More Texas Woman’s University students will receive scholarships to help meet their educational goals thanks to a \$2.2 million gift from the estate of Helen Haddix Deiker of Fort Worth, a past president of the TWU Former Students Association. The gift to the TWU Foundation will be used to establish the Helen Haddix Deiker and Robert W. Deiker Endowment Fund.

“Robert and Helen Deiker were ardent supporters of TWU,” said TWU Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart. “I am grateful for the Deikers’ generous estate planning, which has resulted in one of our largest estate gifts ever and which will enable more of our outstanding students to achieve academic success.”

Mrs. Deiker, 82, who passed away on Oct. 16, 2007, attended Texas Woman’s University in the early 1940s. She taught high school math for many years and served as the head of the special education department at Hindsdale High School in Hinsdale, Ill. She married Robert “Bob” W. Deiker in 1960 and they lived in New York and Illinois before retiring back to Texas. Mr. Deiker passed away in 2002.

According to TWU classmate and lifelong friend Frances Matsler Gordon, Mrs. Deiker was committed to helping TWU because of the important role the university played in her life and education. Mrs. Deiker volunteered extensively for the TWU Former Students Association, receiving the Alumni Service Award in 1988 and serving as president of the from 1992 to 1994. She also spearheaded the effort to create the Frances Matsler Gordon Endowed Scholarship on behalf of the Class of 1945 for its 50th reunion.

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## **MAGAZINE RANKS TWU-HOUSTON'S HCA PROGRAM FOURTH LARGEST**

*Modern Healthcare*, the weekly magazine for hospitals and healthcare industry executives, recently ranked the master of health care administration program at Texas Woman's University's Institute of Health Sciences-Houston Center the fourth largest in the nation.

The rankings were tallied using the total number of students enrolled, based on July 2007 reports. TWU's Houston program tied with the University of Pennsylvania as fourth largest program with 160 students.

Dr. Kelley Moseley, professor and director of TWU-Houston's health care administration program, credits the ranking to the quality of the program, the faculty and the students themselves.

"We're a practice-based program that attracts working healthcare professionals, as well as those without health care experience, who can benefit from the networking opportunities of fellow students working in the industry," Dr. Moseley said.

Dr. Jimmy H. Ishee, dean of the College of Health Sciences, said, "One of the goals in TWU's strategic plan addresses national recognition of programs. This ranking is an excellent example of how the health care administration program in Houston is achieving that goal for the College of Health Sciences."

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## **RAISINGHANI NAMED 2007 G. ANN UHLIR FELLOW**

Dr. Michael Raisinghani, associate professor in the School of Management, has been named the 2007 G. Ann Uhlir Fellow in Higher Education Administration at TWU.

The Uhlir Fellowship is an endowed award, given annually to the faculty or staff member or graduate student submitting the strongest proposal for his or her development as a leader in higher education.

Dr. Raisinghani has served as an associate professor in management in the Executive MBA program at TWU since 2005. During his fellowship, he proposed to study either through the Center for Creative Leadership or the Harvard Executive Education Program. His goal is to "develop my skills in transformative teaching strategies, enhance my skills in encouraging critical reflection/discourse and foster intellectual openness."
