ACCLAIMED AUTHOR MAGUIRE TO SPEAK AT TWU SATURDAY

Acclaimed author Gregory Maguire will discuss his latest work “Matchless,” a re-imagination of the Hans Christian Andersen classic “The Little Match Girl,” during the annual Denton Reads lecture at Texas Woman’s University’s Denton Campus Saturday, Nov. 21.

The lecture will begin at 6 p.m. in the auditorium of the Multipurpose Classroom Lab (MCL) Building, located off of Bell Avenue in Denton. Mr. Maguire is the acclaimed author of the best-selling novel “Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West,” which was made into the hit Broadway musical “Wicked.” His other works include “Confessions of an Ugly Stepsister” and “Son of a Witch,” a sequel to “Wicked.”

Each year Denton Reads hosts a lecture by a notable author to encourage reading in the city of Denton. 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THREE FROM TWU NAMED NATIONAL ROLE MODELS

Texas Woman’s University chemistry professor Dr. James Johnson, director of financial aid Governor Jackson and alumna Dr. Astra Sparks are among are among only 27 in the U.S. named national role models by Minority Access, Inc., a non-profit educational organization.

Dr. Johnson was named a faculty role model for his contributions to increasing the pool of minority biomedical researchers through teaching and mentoring. Mr. Jackson was honored as a staff role model for his success helping minority students attend college.

Dr. Sparks was named an alumni role model for excellence in her profession. She currently serves as a scientific affairs liaison for the national pharmaceutical company Santarus, Inc., in Houston. Dr. Sparks received her MBA in 2009, her doctorate in molecular biology in 1998 and her master's in biology in 1995, all from TWU.

They received their awards during the recent Minority Access 10th Annual National Role Models Conference. The conference is held in partnership with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the National Institutes of Health.

Minority Access presents the annual Role Models Conference to focus the national spotlight on institutions and individuals who have excelled in producing and supporting minority researchers, particularly in the biomedical sciences and health-related fields, and their research efforts.

He began his TWU career as chair of music, dance and drama in 1981. He subsequently served as associate dean and then dean for the College of Arts and Science before retiring in 2005. A private graveside ceremony will be held at a later date.
