TWU TO CONDUCT WINTER COMMENCEMENT DECEMBER 17-19

The fall 2010 semester at Texas Woman's University will draw to a close with commencement ceremonies scheduled Friday and Saturday, Dec. 17 and 18 on TWU's Denton campus, and Sunday, Dec. 19 in Houston.

Students and family members who have tickets are invited to attend. The Denton ceremonies, which include graduates from the Denton and Dallas campuses, will take place in the Kitty Magee Arena in Pioneer Hall. Receptions hosted by TWU Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart will follow each ceremony on the second floor of the Student Union.

Ceremony I, scheduled at 10 a.m. Friday, Dec. 17, is for candidates in the College of Arts and Sciences, not including the School of Management. David Martino, a Denton entrepreneur, will deliver the commencement address. Ceremony II will begin at 2 p.m. and will include candidates from the College of Nursing and the School of Management. Miriam Sibley, chief nursing officer for the Parkland Health & Hospital System of Dallas and a TWU alumna, will speak.

Ceremony III will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 18, with Dr. Billie Askew, TWU alumna and Cornaro Professor Emerita of Reading addressing the graduates. Candidates from the College of Professional Education, not including the School of Library and Information Studies, will participate in Ceremony III. Ceremony IV, scheduled at 2 p.m., will include candidates from the College of Health Sciences and the School of Library and Information Studies. Francis Radford Ray, an author, school nurse practitioner in the Dallas Independent School District and a TWU alumna, will address the graduates.

TWU's Houston ceremony, scheduled at 2 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 19, will take place in the George R. Brown Convention Center, 1001 Avenida de las Americas. Carol Oddo, vice president of patient and public affairs for the Harris County Hospital District, will deliver the commencement address.

TWU'S NURSING WEEKEND PROGRAM RECEIVES STAR AWARD

Texas Woman's University's Undergraduate Nursing Weekend Program is one of four programs in the state to receive a prestigious 2010 Texas Higher Education Star Award from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB).

The Star Awards recognize institutions of higher education, public and private schools, school districts, organizations, groups and individuals for exceptional contributions toward one or more of the goals outlined in the Texas higher education plan "Closing the Gaps by 2015." Adopted by the THECB in 2000, the plan established four goals – to close the gaps in student participation, student success, academic excellence and research.

"Receiving this award is a testament to our nursing faculty and their commitment to creating and implementing innovative programs that meet the needs of working students who want to become nurses," said Dr. Patricia Holden-Huchton, dean of the TWU College of Nursing.

Offered at the TWU Dallas-Parkland Center, TWU's nursing weekend program is designed for individuals with non-nursing bachelor's degrees who want to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing, with an emphasis on the recruitment of racial and ethnic minority students and students from underserved areas. The program also is designed to meet the needs of students facing economic hardships, including job loss. Nursing courses are offered 100 percent online with nursing clinical experiences on the weekends, so students can continue working while earning a baccalaureate nursing degree.

"Graduates of the TWU weekend nursing program will improve health access, decrease health disparities within their selected communities and bolster the nursing workforce in the state of Texas," said Dr. Stephanie Woods, associate dean of the TWU College of Nursing in Dallas.

Earlier this year TWU received a \$744,422 federal grant to nearly double its nursing weekend program. The grant, which is from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), will help fund 80 new nursing students in the TWU nursing weekend program from 2010 to 2013. Dr. Susan Chaney, nursing professor and program director of the TWU nursing weekend program, and Dr. Susan Sheriff, TWU nursing professor and nursing weekend program project coordinator, received the grant.
