BRADSHAW DAY TO FOCUS ON INFORMATION POLICY

The eighth annual Lillian Moore Bradshaw Day will be presented by the School of Library and Information Studies on Thursday, May 5, with a focus on "Information Policy and Planning for the 21st Century." A highlight of the day will be a lecture by Dr. Kathleen de la Pena McCook, 1994 Bradshaw Scholar and director of the School of Library and Information Science at the University of South Florida.

Following a morning meeting of the TWU school's advisory committee and a luncheon for members and faculty, registration for the Bradshaw Day workshop will be held from 1:30 to 2 p.m. in ACT 2. A panel discussion by the advisory committee, moderated by Mary Machin, will focus on "Project Century 21" from 2 to 3:15 p.m. in ACT 301. A panel session on "Distance Education for Professional Librarianship" will be held from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. in ACT 301, with participants Bob Swisher, University of Oklahoma; Ray von Dran, University of North Texas; and Keith Swigger, dean, TWU School of Library and Information Studies.

Tours and demonstrations will be from 4:30 to 5:15 p.m., with visits to the media laboratory, interactive television facility, information retrieval laboratory, software demonstration lab, automation laboratory and children's library, all in Stoddard Hall. Beta Phi Mu, library science honor society, will meet at 5:30 p.m. in Stoddard Hall 402, and a reception for Bradshaw Day participants will be held from 5:30 to 6:15 p.m. in the Hubbard Hall Banquet Room.

Following dinner at 6:15 p.m. in the Banquet Room, Dr. McCook will give the Bradshaw Lecture at 7:30 p.m. on "Toward a Just and Productive Society: Issues in Information Policy" in ACT 301. Reservations for the afternoon sessions, reception, dinner and lecture are \$30 each; for sessions only, \$20; for dinner and lecture only, \$20; and no charge for the lecture only. Library School students may attend the afternoon sessions and lecture free, but will be charged \$12 if they attend the dinner. Dinner reservations, which are due by Monday, May 2, may be made by calling Ext. 2602. All proceeds after expenses will go to the endowment fund for the Lillian Moore Bradshaw Chair.

McCook, who will also teach a seminar at TWU during the fall 1994 semester, was coordinator for strategic planning, dean of the Graduate School and dean of the School of Library and Information Science at Louisiana State University, and held various teaching positions there and at universities in Wisconsin and Illinois. She received the Excellence in Research Award from LSU for her studies on life-long learning and the Monroe Award from the American Library Association for her research in adult services and adult education.

McCook also has served as a consultant for the White House Conference on Library and Information Services, was a reviewer for "Humanities in Libraries Programs" for the National Endowment for the Humanities and wrote a special report for the Department of Education on "Partners for Lifelong Learning: Public Libraries and Adult Education." She is author or co-author of 12 books, including *Developing Readers' Advisory Service: Concepts and Commitments* and *Library Support Staff: Challenges for the '90s*, as well as many professional articles.

TWU INDUCTS SIX INTO ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Four athletes, a former coach and longtime physical education faculty member will be the first inductees into the new TWU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame on Friday, May 6. Those being honored are: Kathy Arendsen, one of the best pitchers in the history of amateur softball and a member of the 1979 TWU national champion softball team; Mary (Poggy) Suba Barbaria, four-time Texas singles badminton champion; Margaret Varner Bloss, former world champion singles badminton player; Bert Lyle, who coached TWU track and field teams to five national championships; Kitty Magee, professor emerita of physical education; and Louise Ritter, an Olympic gold medalist in the high jump.

The induction ceremony will highlight a banquet beginning at 5:45 p.m. in Hubbard Hall. Reservations were due by April 26.

Arendsen, currently head softball coach at Yale University, is a three-time winner of the Broderick Award, presented annually to the nation's top collegiate softball player. After winning the 1979 national championship at TWU, she transferred to California State University at Chico, where she was a member of the 1980 national championship team. In 1981, Arendsen was a finalist for the James E. Sullivan Award as the top amateur athlete in the United States.

Barbaria, who won the Texas singles badminton championship from 1942 to 1946, was also a four-time All-American in both field hockey and lacrosse from 1943 to 1947. She holds bachelor's and master's degrees in health and physical education from TWU.

Bloss was the All-England ladies singles champion in badminton in 1955 and 1956, the same year she held the world championship. She also was the All-England ladies doubles champion in 1958, and the U.S. ladies singles and mixed doubles champion in 1956 and 1960, respectively. In addition to her badminton titles, Bloss also held several state and national titles in tennis, including the national junior girls championship in 1944 and 1945 and the Texas state singles championships five times. She also held several national titles in squash.

Lyle, who was track coach and athletic director at TWU from 1965 to 1988, led his teams to three Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women and two Track and Field Federation national championships. Under his direction, TWU athletes also won many individual national titles and set national records in the sprint, hurdles, high jump, long jump and relays. An Olympics coach, Lyle has held many leadership positions in track and field at the national and international levels.

Ritter, who was among the athletes who set track and field records under Lyle's coaching, set 12 national collegiate records during her five years at TWU (1976 to 1981) and was a three-time national champion in high jump. She went on to win the gold medal in the high jump at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul, South Korea, and to win a bronze medal at the world championships. Ritter still holds the U.S. record in the high jump.

Magee, who served as a TWU faculty member for 31 years, developed the sports and aquatic course outlines for the university and, during her career, taught fencing, rifle shooting, horseback riding, swimming and most other sports. She was a founding member of the TWU Athletic Council, a sponsor of the Women's Recreation Association and president of the TWU National Alumnae Association. She also was president of the Texas Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance; the first chair of the Texas Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics for Women; and a member of the Governor's Committee for Lifetime Sports, among other honors.

SURVEY SHOWS SUPPORT FOR 4-DAY WORK WEEK

A recent survey of university staff by the office of administrative services and auxiliary enterprises shows that 80 percent favor a 10-hour/four-day work week during the summer months, when most offices are open from 7 a.m. until 6 p.m. TWU adopted the short work week several years ago and will go on the schedule May 16. The five-day work week will resume on Aug. 22.

Preliminary results of the survey, released April 14, show support for the four-day work week by all campuses--Denton (84%), Dallas-Parkland (75%), Dallas-Presbyterian (53%) and Houston (54%). A slightly larger percentage of male employees (72.5%) than female (69.3%) were in favor of the short schedule. All age groups supported it, especially those age 21-30 (74.6%) and those 41-50 (70.1%); those over 60 were least in favor (56.1%). Most widowed employees favored the schedule (71.4%), but others also preferred it--single, never married (67.8%); married (67%) and divorced or separated (64.8%).

The response was less favorable when measured by work productivity. When asked if the 10-hour/four-day work week tends to maintain a normal level of productivity, 46.8 percent said yes; 22.3 percent felt the level was reduced; 23.7 percent said there was an increase; and 7.2 percent had no opinion.

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TEXPREP IS NOW 'NORTH TEXPREP'

TexPREP, an eight-week summer program in mathematics and science for middle and high school students, will be expanded this year to include new sites in Dallas and Denton. The program, which has been offered for several years through TWU's Institute of Health Sciences Dallas Center at Parkland, will now include SMU and UT-Dallas, as well as TWU's main campus in Denton.

"North TexPREP is one of 11 programs of the Texas PreCollege Engineering Program across the state," said Cathy Banks, program administrator and director of the TWU Science and Mathematics Center for Women. Funded by Texas Instruments, the TI Foundation and the Coordinating Board, the program is a project of the Metroplex Alliance for Engineering Education, an advisory group of the Alliance for Higher Education.

The program, which will be offered June 6-July 28, "will provide educational enrichment opportunities for high ability middle school and secondary school students who are interested in pursuing careers in science or engineering," said Banks. "The emphasis of this program will be on study and research work in mathematics, engineering and computer science."

Target students for the program include women and students from minority groups who traditionally have been under-represented in engineering. A first-year program--logic, introduction to engineering, computer science (Pascal) and topics in problem solving--will be taught at UT-D, SMU and TWU-Denton; second- and third-year classes--engineering, algebraic structures and other courses--will be taught at Dallas-Parkland.

Applications for the program were due April 29, but late applications will be accepted until May 20 and will be considered if openings are available. For information about requirements or registration, call Banks at Ext. 2769.

SUMMER SCIENCES CAMPS OFFERED FOR GIRLS

Girls, traditionally under-represented in science and mathematics, can learn more about careers in those fields and meet women already succeeding in nontraditional jobs when they attend ACES (Access to Careers in the Sciences) Camps at TWU this summer. The camps will be held June 19 through July 1 for girls in grades 6 and 7, and July 10-22 for those in grades 8 through 11.

The TWU Science and Mathematics Center for Women, directed by Cathy Banks, began offering ACES camps in 1988. The camps emphasize "hands on" laboratory experiments, as well as class visits by guest speakers--mostly women--who discuss their careers, related to science and mathematics. 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DIRECTOR OF STUDENT DEVELOPMENT NAMED

Monica Mendez-Grant, formerly program and minority student advisor at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, has been named director of student development at TWU, effective May 30. The announcement was made by Dr. Glenda Simmons, vice president for student life.

Mendez-Grant, who succeeds Linda Webber in the position, will be responsible for student organizations, leadership development programs and the Leadership Council, Student Government Association and commuter student services. She will also help facilitate all student life programs, such as summer orientation, Parent-Family Weekend and other events.

A graduate of the University of North Texas, Mendez-Grant earned her B.B.A. in sales management-marketing, her M.Ed. in college and university counseling and has done post graduate work in higher education administration. At TCU, she also was a counselor and multicultural-leadership facilitator, prepared a resource guide for ethnic minority students and gave various workshop presentations related to student and staff diversity issues. She received the TCU Outstanding Staff Member Award in 1993.
