FOUR-DAY WORK WEEK SET FOR SUMMER

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) has announced that TWU will begin a four-day work week, effective Mon., May 15, for the summer. University offices will be open 10 hours per day, Monday through Thursday, from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.; most university offices will be closed Fridays.

On the Denton campus, ASB and Stoddard Hall will be open on Fridays and Saturdays. These buildings should be used for necessary classes, meetings and other essential activities.

Exceptions to the four-day work week include certain offices that will remain open in order to maintain essential services, as well as the following:

■ *Dallas Center-Presbyterian, occupational therapy and physical therapy* -- Offices will be open four and one-half days per week (nine hours per day, Monday through Thursday, and four hours on Friday);

■ *Houston Center, physical therapy* -- Offices will be open four and one-half days per week (nine hours per day, Monday through Thursday, and four hours on Friday);

■ *Certain student life offices in Denton* -- These offices will continue with a five and one-half-day work week; and

■ *Denton undergraduate admissions/registration and the financial aid office* -- These offices will continue on a five-day work week and will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The office of graduate admissions will close on Fridays. Information about graduate admissions will be available on those days from the office of undergraduate admissions.

The university will return to a five-day work week on Monday, August 21.

"FACETS OF FIBER" EXHIBIT OPENS IN GALLERIES

"Facets of Fiber," an exhibit featuring the works of 37 nationally and internationally known artists, will be on view April 10-30 in the East and West Fine Arts Galleries in the TWU arts building. LAZEROW LECTURE SCHEDULED

The 1995 TWU Lazerow Lecture, featuring Dr. Martin Dillon, will be held on Thurs., April 20, in the Blagg-Huey Library lecture hall. The program, which is free and open to the public, will begin at 7:30 p.m. For more information, call ext. 2602.

Dillon, who will discuss "Core Librarianship in an Electronic World," is director of the library resources management division of OCLC; that division is responsible for managing OCLC's cataloging and resource sharing service. Previously he served as director of the office of research at OCLC from 1986-1993, where he guided a staff of 30 in research that supported OCLC's mission of improving access to information. Dillon was a faculty member in the School of Library and Information Science at the University of North Carolina from 1970 to 1985, where his teaching and research focused on topics in library automation and information retrieval. He has published many articles in library and information science literature as well.

The Samuel Lazerow Memorial Lecture is presented by a distinguished scholar each academic year. Under the sponsorship of the Institute for Scientific Information, the lectures are presented at the nation's leading library schools. In Denton, the lecture is presented alternately by the TWU School of Library and Information Studies and the School of Library and Information Sciences at the University of North Texas. The lectures honor Samuel Lazerow, an early leader in library automation projects at the National Library of Medicine and the Library of Congress. He was senior vice president at the Institute for Science Information from 1972 until his death in 1973.

"The workshops will present a comprehensive view of the four human potentials of each individual as parts of the communal soul -- spiritual, mental, physical and emotion," said Dr. Glenda Simmons (student life). "These will be approached from a tribal, holistic perspective."

Frank McLemore (Cherokee or Tsa-la-gi), president of the Tribal American Network, Inc., will be the presenter for both sessions. Two one-hour videos will be shown. On Monday, "Honor of All" recreates the story of the Alkali Lake Indian Band's struggle to overcome and conquer the widespread disease of alcoholism -- a true story that documents their experiences, which led to a 95 percent sobriety rate among its members.

"Healing the Hurts" will be shown on Tuesday; the film is a psychodrama workshop that discusses various causes of pain, which result in an unbalanced life. Dr. Phil Lane, a presenter in the video, introduces methods which may be used for coping and lessening pain, and to restore balance and well-being.

UPDATE ON TWU ATHLETICS

The TWU Pioneers gymnastics team, ranked number one in the country, is one of eight women's teams that qualified for the USA Gymnastics Collegiate National Championships, hosted by TWU this month. Women's collegiate, men's collegiate and men's club team qualifiers will compete at the University of North Texas coliseum April 13-15 for national titles. TWU also hosted the championships in 1994.

Other women's teams that will compete include the University of Maryland, Seattle Pacific University, California State University-Sacramento, the University of Bridgeport, Southern Connecticut State University, UC-Davis and the U.S. Air Force Academy. Eight women will compete for the women's all-around; six men's collegiate teams qualified; and four men's clubs will compete.

The first and second rounds of the women's preliminaries are scheduled on April 13 at 5 p.m.; the men's collegiate/club championships are scheduled at 12:30 p.m. and women's collegiate championships will be held at 7:30 p.m. on April 14; and the men's and women's individual finals will take place on April 15 at 7 p.m. Event passes and tickets for individual sessions can be purchased through the TWU department of athletics. Per session, the cost of tickets is: adults --\$7; students -- \$5; any university student with valid identification -- \$5; children 12 and under, \$4. An event pass is \$20 for adults, \$15 for students, \$15 for any university student with valid ID, and \$10 for children ages 12 and under.
