PLANS FOR INAUGURATION ACTIVITIES ANNOUNCED

Faculty, staff, students, former students and friends of TWU are invited to attend the inauguration of Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) as the university's ninth president on Fri., Feb. 17, 1995 -- also Founders' Day. The inauguration begins at 2 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall, followed by a reception in Hubbard Hall to honor both the TWU community and its new president.

"The inauguration of our ninth president, Dr. Surles, is a special day for the university and for the communities, friends and supporters who believe in the mission of this institution," said Dr. Wilkes Berry (academic affairs). Berry, who is chair of the inauguration committee, added, "We have planned a special series of events -- an Academic Festival -- and the ceremony itself to celebrate TWU and the inauguration."

Clarification of previous information: The entire campus community may attend the inaugural ceremony. Classes will be canceled in Denton only from 2 to 3:30 p.m. so that students can participate in the ceremony; Denton offices will be open all day, except from 2 to 3:30 p.m., for the event. Units that provide essential services -- for example, central meal service, the Child Development Center and the department of public safety -- will remain open throughout the day.

The platform party, marshals, presidential escort and the president will process from the ground level of ACT (weather permitting), beginning at 1:50 p.m., down Redbud Lane to Margo Jones. Faculty who plan to participate in the procession should arrive at 1:30 p.m. in their regalia at ACT. If the weather is bad, everyone is asked to meet at 1:30 p.m. on the second floor of Margo Jones. The platform party will robe in a separate location and join the faculty, escort and Surles before the procession begins.

The Academic Festival, scheduled Feb. 13-16, celebrates Founders' Day and the president's inauguration. Activities will feature four presentations, as well as a tree planting ceremony. All programs are free and open to the public; a videoconference on Tues., Feb. 14, offers seating limited to 20 persons in Denton, as well as Dallas and Houston. A detailed schedule is listed below.

SOS: STUDENTS ARE ASKED TO SHARE OPINIONS

The office of student life and the office of enrollment management will mail a multiple-page "Student Opinion Survey (SOS)" during the first week of February to 1,200 students at TWU, asking for their thoughts about a number of areas that focus on both personal demographics and campus experiences. A postcard was mailed last week to the random list of recipients, notifying them that the survey is coming. (All recipients were enrolled for the fall 1994 semester.) The SOS mailing will be followed up with a second postcard, reminding students to return their surveys.

Each packet comprises a letter from Dr. Carol Surles (president's office), a computerized survey form with questions (16 items that request background information, 23 questions related to student services, 42 questions about university environment, 30 questions prepared by university administrators and a section for comments), a separate list of specific questions related to TWU, and a postage-paid envelope so that respondents can return their surveys at TWU's expense.

"The objective of our Student Opinion Survey is to assess student perceptions of the campus climate and their experiences at TWU," said Dr. Glenda Simmons (student life). "We urge the 1,200 students who were randomly selected to participate, consider the questions and offer straightforward answers. We want to know what students think, and we are asking them to return their surveys no later than March 1." Answers then will be tabulated and analyzed, and a final report summarizing the findings should be available by the end of the summer.

Faculty are asked to encourage any students in their classes who receive the survey to participate. "Only with good participation can we have confidence in the information we receive," said Simmons." Completed questionnaires will be sent to American College Testing for scoring and report preparation. For more information, call the office of student life at ext. 3601.
