LIS PROFESSOR LEADS "CHILDREN'S CHOICE" AGAIN

Dr. Betty Carter (Library and Information Studies) is one of five team leaders for the 1995 Children's Choice Project, a national program that surveys children's reading preferences. She previously served as a team leader in 1993-94 as well.

Sponsored by the Children's Book Council and the International Reading Association, the Children's Choice Project is the only national program that seeks to learn what kinds of books children read and like -- or don't like -- when they are left to their own devices. Adults participate only in getting the books to the kids and in getting the youngsters' views.

Team leaders distribute books provided by CBC publishers to teachers and librarians in their geographic areas. The books are made available to children ages 5 to 13, who alone choose the books they want to read. Each book contains a paper ballot, which the child completes and turns in with the book. Books are read aloud to children who are too young to read. On their book ballots, youngsters mark a face that most resembles their feelings about the book. The results are tabulated by team leaders and sent to CBC, which publishes an annual list of the 100 books that received the most positive votes from children nationwide. BIONIC WEEK ACTIVITIES ANNOUNCED

BIONIC (Believe It Or Not I Can) Week, scheduled April 1-7, will be observed at both TWU and the University of North Texas to celebrate the accomplishments of all persons with disabilities. The annual observance, begun several years ago at TWU, will include educational seminars at both universities, as well as a special luncheon, Artists' Alley, a technology fair and BIONIC Avenue. Most activities are free, with the exception of the luncheon.

"BIONIC Week is the time when special emphasis is given to creating a positive awareness of persons with disabilities," said Juanita Duenez-Lazo (student activities). "More importantly, it is a time to focus on the positive aspects of the accomplishments and skills of persons with disabilities." The theme for this year's event is "Disabled: More Alike Than Different."

The luncheon, scheduled on Wed., April 5, will be held from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Hubbard Hall banquet room. The invited speaker is Amy Baxter, Miss Wheelchair Texas. DENTAL HYGIENE OFFERS PLAQUE CONTROL HELP

In March, TWU juniors enrolled in dental hygiene's preventive dentistry course will provide the first of four treatments that comprise a series of plaque control appointments for patients who are interested in fighting tooth decay and gum disease. Persons who wish to participate must be available for all four dates in the series: March 22, March 29, April 5 and May 3. All appointments (each approximately 45 minutes in length) are scheduled on Wednesday morning at 8 or 9 a.m.

"Plaque control for participants will include personalized instruction on how to arrest and prevent the major dental diseases -- dental decay and gum disease," said Dr. Nancy Glick (dental hygiene). No fee is charged for the service; interested persons should call ext. 2888.

Participants will be provided with information and skills to achieve their best oral health, according to Glick. ■ Film series: *The Eye of the Storm*; Thurs., March 30, 11 a.m., SC 006-007. This award-winning documentary is a record of an innovative experiment in which a third-grade teacher divides her all-white class into "blue eyes" and "brown eyes," making each group superior or inferior on successive days. The program demonstrates the nature and effects of bigotry by showing changes that occur in the students' behavior and learning patterns. The film will be hosted by Dr. Jane Walker (early childhood and special education).

■ Presentation: *Developing a Healthy Fear of Litigation*; Fri., March 31, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., SC 207-208. This program will feature two guest speakers. Anthony Hightower, from the office of civil rights, U.S. Department of Education, will provide information about Section 504 of the Americans With Disabilities Act. Jacqueline R. Bradley, director of the Dallas district offices of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, will present information on how to identify and address racial discrimination and sexual harassment in the university environment.

STUDENT VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR "DENTON TOGETHER!"

TWU, the city of Denton and the University of North Texas are sponsoring Denton Together! -- a joint effort by students at TWU and UNT to make a difference in the Denton community. A week of activities is scheduled April 1-8 and will include projects such as doing clean-up and fix-up work (April 1); assisting with the Keep Denton Beautiful program (April 2); sponsoring senior citizens' projects (April 3); conducting community-wide food and clothing drives (clothing drive on April 4 and canned food drive on April 6); giving campus tours at both TWU and UNT (April 7); holding a civic leadership day (April 5); and providing activities for children during "Just for Kids" Field Day (April 8).

"Denton Together! is a week of activities in which university students are volunteering their time and energy to participate in community projects," said Patrick Vasquez (student development). "This project is an opportunity to give something back to the people of Denton and to make positive contributions to the lives of Denton citizens."

Denton Together! will begin with a kick-off celebration at the intersection of Bell Avenue and Administration Drive at TWU on Sat., April 1, at 9 a.m. The week will conclude with a similar event at UNT.

DEFENSIVE DRIVING COURSE SCHEDULED

The TWU department of public safety will offer a defensive driving course on Sat., March 31, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in ACT 501 (which includes a one-hour lunch break). The course is designed for persons who will drive state vehicles and who have not had defensive driving within the last three years. Each course will include the standard defensive driving course, a review of the new university policy on vehicle operations and a practical driving test.

A course fee of \$20 is due at the beginning of the morning session and may be paid in one of three ways: cash (change will not be available); check (made payable to TWU); or interdepartmental transfer.

Drivers who have documentation that shows they have taken a defensive driving course within the last three years need only to take the practical skills portion, which covers a review of the new university policy on vehicle operations and the practical driving test. The next practical skills test will be offered at 8:30 a.m. on April 21. This portion of the authorization process is provided at no cost to participants.
