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## **FORMER DEAN WILL DELIVER BRADSHAW LECTURE**

Dr. Brooke Sheldon, former dean of the TWU School of Library and Information Studies, will present the 10th annual Lillian Bradshaw lecture on Thurs., April 18, at 8 p.m. Sheldon, who currently is dean of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science for the University of Texas at Austin, will discuss "Leadership and Power in Libraries." The lecture, scheduled in ACT 301, is free and open to the public and the campus community.

Each year the endowment for the Bradshaw Visiting Scholar -- named in honor of Lillian Bradshaw -- enables TWU to bring an outstanding scholar to present the Bradshaw lecture and to conduct a summer seminar. "Bradshaw's career manifests the highest aspirations of professional librarianship," said Dr. Keith Swigger (Library and Information Studies). "Her leadership, energy, intelligence and astuteness have inspired those who share her belief that strong libraries are essential public institutions assuring every person opportunities for education and growth."

Bradshaw was director of the Dallas Public Libraries from 1962-1984. In 1971-72, she served as president of the American Library Association. She earned her bachelor's degree at Western Maryland College and her master's degree in library science from Drexel University, where she later was honored with the degree of Doctor of Letters. Bradshaw was a librarian at the Utica Public Library and the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore before she came to Dallas. She continues to be an active leader in professional and civic affairs.

The summer institute that Sheldon will conduct is titled "A Seminar on Leadership and Power in Libraries" and will meet July 15 through July 30, daily, from 1 to 5 p.m.

During her tenure at TWU, Sheldon established the Bradshaw lecture series and created the Bradshaw endowment. From 1979 to 1980, she served as acting provost. The guest lecturer graduated from Acadia University in Nova Scotia; she earned her master's degree in library science from Simmons College and her doctorate at the University of Pittsburgh. An author, lecturer and consultant, Sheldon received an honorary Doctor of Civil Laws degree from Acadia University (1985), as well as distinguished alumni awards from both Simmons and Pittsburgh.

Sheldon's book, *Leaders in Libraries: Styles and Strategies for Success* (1991), is a library "best seller." A forthcoming book, *Library and Information Science Education in the United States*, will be published soon. She also has served in a number of professional capacities: president of the American Library Association; a founder of the Continuing Professional Education Roundtable in IFLA; and current chair of the ALA committee on accreditation.

To update the campus community on TWU's new waste paper recycling program, Dr. Harry Meeuwsen (kinesiology) recently explained some changes. You don't need to worry about what kind of paper is recyclable -- virtually all paper is recyclable...even cardboard boxes."

To make recycling more convenient, custodians will collect personal office waste paper from each office every Monday, beginning March 25. They will not collect garbage on Mondays - only paper. Faculty, staff and students are asked to place their paper containers where custodians easily can see and retrieve them. "With these changes, TWU should be able to recycle all of its office waste paper," added Meeuwssen. "We thank all faculty, staff and students for their continued support."

TWU tennis coach James Schulze has announced his retirement after 13 years at TWU, according to Judy Southard (athletics). "My association with the tennis team members, faculty, administration and TWU personnel will remain priceless to me forever," said Schulze. "I am very grateful for the years spent here and for lasting friendships I've forged with some highly dedicated people." Schulze, who also enjoys flying, is a decorated Army Air Corps pilot from World War II who participated in the Normandy invasion. He earned his bachelor's degree from East Texas State University.

Schulze has won more than 160 tournaments in singles, doubles and mixed doubles (including 50 state championships and four National Senior Olympics titles), plus the U.S. Tennis Association National Hard Court Consolation Men's 65 tournament twice, the Texas Senior Olympic Games at least 13 times in singles and 10 times in doubles, the Dallas Open Senior Singles, the National Public Parks Senior Singles Championship twice, the USTA National Indoor Men's 60 Consolation tournament and others. He also recently assisted university officials with the design and construction of TWU's new tennis courts.

Although he is retiring, Schulze will continue to play tennis and to compete. He and his wife, Margaret, will celebrate their 53rd wedding anniversary on May 1. They have lived in Denton since 1960 and have one daughter, Dixie McMath, who teaches health and physical education at Lewisville High School.
