REGENTS EXTEND PRESIDENT'S CONTRACT, APPROVE OTHER ITEMS

The TWU board of regents held its quarterly meeting at the Institute of Health Sciences Dallas Center (both Presbyterian and Parkland) March 14 and 15. Following committee meetings on Thursday, regents voted during the general public meeting on Friday to extend TWU President Carol Surles' contract for five years. They noted that Surles would not receive an increase in pay, at her request. In other business, the regents:

- Approved an exemption of persons 65 years of age or older from payment of tuition for up to six semester hours of credit each semester or summer term if space is available and if the persons otherwise are eligible to take the classes for credit.

- Approved a number of contracts and agreements for construction (including the new Movement Sciences Complex), renovation, architectural services, clinical agreements, programs and research, plus the implementation of a one card/entry access system which will allow the TWU student ID card to be used for entering housing, charging meals, making bookstore purchases and serving as a debit card for other payments and purchases on campus.

- Approved fiscal 1997 budget guidelines.

The operating budget guidelines for fiscal year 1997 included five specific items, all contingent on the approval of a \$7 increase in the general use fee following a public hearing on the proposed fee increase. The total funds available for fiscal year 1997 education and general (E&G) operating budget are projected to be \$47,441,409. Of this total, approximately \$38.6 million comes from state appropriations, and the balance of \$8.8 million is from local E&G income. This figure represents an increase of only \$212,269 in revenue over the prior year's budget. "To maintain the current level of services, meet inflationary costs and maintain our relative standing with other universities, an additional \$1.5 million is needed," said Don Henry (fiscal affairs). The \$7 increase in the general use fee would be used to bridge the gap in funding.

The budget items proposed for fiscal year 1997 -- *contingent upon approval of the general use fee* -- include: minimal increases in maintenance, operating and travel allocations; established (already existing) salary additives related to faculty tenure and promotion; a general salary increase for faculty and staff; essential faculty support to sustain present academic programs; and additional administrative positions to support technology and information systems management.

During the president's report on Friday, Surles shared details on activities at TWU, including forums, the Spirit Clinic dedication, the Movement Sciences Complex groundbreaking and her participation in several celebrations of Black History Month, as well as several guest speakers, programs and other activities on campus. Surles added that she, Dr. Jim Alexander (history and government) and Kathleen Gigl (institutional advancement) are working with legislators to prepare for the next biennial session. Committee meetings reports from institutional advancement, academic affairs, student affairs, and finance and audit were presented as well about strategic planning, enrollment management, development, alumni relations, public information, fiscal affairs (including investments), the Hubbard Hall renovation, students activities and other areas.

"THE SECRET GARDEN" OPENS FRIDAY

The Secret Garden, a musical about a girl who lives with her embittered and reclusive uncle in England, opens at TWU at 8 p.m. on Fri., March 29, at Redbud Theatre. *The Secret Garden* is the first spring production for the TWU Theater '96 season. Other performances are scheduled Sat., March 30, and Fri., April 5, at 8 p.m.; and two on Sat., April 6, at 2 and 8 p.m. Tickets are \$5 for TWU students; \$7 for students, senior citizens, TWU faculty and staff; and \$10 for adults. The box office will open on Mon., March 25, for reservations. Hours are Monday through Saturday from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. The box office also will be open Saturday and Sunday from noon to 5:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. until curtain time on performance days. The play, sponsored by the TWU department of performing arts, in conjunction with the Denton Light Opera Company, focuses on a troubled 11-year-old who is placed in the care of her uncle, Archibald Craven, after losing her parents during a cholera epidemic while they were living in India in 1906. Charles Harrill (performing arts, drama) and Adrienne Fisk (performing arts, dance) are directing the production.

TWU's march begins at 6 p.m. at the Pioneer Woman statue; UNT participants start their walk simultaneously at the bronze eagle's statue outside the Union building. ON MY OWN TIME: ART (AND LIFE) AT TWU!

TWU faculty and staff are invited to participate in the university's fifth annual "On My Own Time" employee arts and crafts exhibition, which will be displayed April 29 through May 10, 1996. The deadline for entries is 4 p.m. on Fri., April 12. Original works of art are requested for the following categories: 1 -- painting; 2 -- drawing/graphics; 3 -- color photography; 4 -- black and white photography; 5 -- sculpture; 6 -- textile crafts; and 7 -- non-textile crafts.

A panel of judges will select the best in-house art during the week of May 6-10; these works will be exhibited in a city-wide show at the Center for the Visual Arts in June and July, which will be coordinated by the Greater Denton Arts Council.

Any TWU employee is eligible to enter the "On My Own Time" employee art exhibit. However, professional artists who work on campus may not enter work in those categories for which they are compensated or for which they teach. Other requirements are listed below.

- An entry must be the employee's original work.
- An entry must have been created on the artist's own time.
- An entry must have been created within the last three years.
- Work entered in previous "On My Own Time" exhibitions is not eligible.
- Only four entries per employee will be accepted.
- Each piece must be framed and/or ready for hanging or display. Pieces that do not meet this requirement will be disqualified.
- Kits will not be considered for the city exhibition but may be displayed at TWU's in-house show. They must be labeled "Kit" for the judges.
- Each entry must be labeled with the following information: a) employee's name; b) employee's department; c) art/craft category; d) title of work; and e) year of creation.

TWU winners whose works will be displayed in the city exhibit must meet additional requirements:

- No more than two entries per artist will be selected for the city exhibition.
- Pieces selected for the city show must be delivered to the Greater Denton Arts Council by the exhibitor and must meet GDAC's deadline to be included in the exhibition.

A DECADE OF TALL TALES CONTINUES IN DENTON

Ten years...tall tales...Texas...What do they have in common? It's the 11th anniversary of the Texas Storytelling Festival -- celebrating "10 full years of Texas tales," a growing event presented by the Tejas Storytelling Association in conjunction with the TWU School of Library and Information Studies and the City of Denton department of parks and recreation. The festival also is funded in part through support from the Greater Denton Arts Council and the Texas Commission on the Arts, with special thanks to the Denton Public Library.

The festival, scheduled March 28-31, begins on an eerie note with ghost tales on Thursday night. On Friday, activities continue with a number of workshops with noted storytellers, an evening olio and late-night tales with J.J. Reneaux. Saturday features a session on "Kids' Tales," plus additional workshops, a children's concert, the festival barbecue and "tale tellin'" -- plus a regional concert, the Texas Talespinners party and Saturday evening olio. As the event winds down on Sunday, participants will enjoy a post-festival workshop, sacred stories and a special Sunday concert. All activities will be held in Civic Center Park, just south of TWU on Bell Avenue.

Seven internationally known storytellers will enthrall festival-goers: Jeannine Pasini Beekman of Oklahoma (now a Houston resident); Michael Cotter of Minnesota; Bobby Norfolk of Georgia; J.J. Reneaux (with that Cajun-style storytelling from Louisiana); Jay Stailey of Texas (and chair of the National Storytelling Association); Jackie Torrence (a major force in the modern American storytelling revival); and Judy Dockrey Young (whose stories hail from Oklahoma, Missouri and the Ozarks). Hiroko Fujita of Japan also will share traditional tales in one of 12 workshops that will be offered by a number of storytelling experts and the featured speakers.

The cost to attend all activities is \$75 per person; tickets will be available on site. Several special programs are open to the public at separate prices; the children's concert, sacred stories and 150 years of Denton stories are free events. BIRACIAL ISSUES EXPLORED IN TWU CONFERENCE

Outsiders on the inside -- biracial issues -- will be the focus of a one-day conference presented on Fri., April 5, by the departments of sociology and social work at both TWU and UNT as part of the Federation of North Texas Area Universities seminar series. The program, titled "The Experience of Biculturality and Marginality," will be held in MCL auditorium from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.; the cost to attend is \$45 per person, plus an additional \$8 for lunch. Described as "an important yet relatively neglected issue," biculturality and marginality represents a growing dimension of race relations in the United States. In response to the growing need for more information and for better intercommunal and interpersonal relationships, two featured speakers will talk about the topic and challenge participants to grow by using what they learn during the program. Internationally known expert Dr. Orlando Patterson of Harvard University will discuss "The Paradoxes of Race and Marginality in American Society" at 9:30 a.m., and TWU faculty member Dr. Mahmoud Sadri (sociology and social work) will talk about "The Prevalence of Marginality and Biculturality: Suggestions for an Expanded Investigation."

Patterson, the James Cowles Professor of Sociology at Harvard, was educated in Jamaica and London. The author of seven books, he has examined slavery as a worldwide institution and now focuses his research efforts to contemporary America -- particularly the intersecting problems of race, immigration and multiculturalism. Patterson earned his bachelor's degree in economics from UCWI-London and his doctorate in sociology from the London School of Economics. He began teaching at Harvard in 1969 and became a full professor after one year.

Patterson's books include: *Slavery and Social Death: A Comparative Study* (which received the Distinguished Contribution to Scholarship Award from the American Sociological Association); *Ethnic Chauvinism: The Reactionary Impulse*; *Freedom in the Making of Western Culture* (the first of a two-volume historical sociology of freedom that won the National Book Award for non-fiction in 1991); *Freedom*; and three novels. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Patterson's lifelong interests have focused on the problems of slavery and freedom.

Concurrent roundtables scheduled at 10:45 a.m. include inter-religious understanding, first-generation immigrants, second-generation immigrants, interracial marriage and family, bicultural curriculum, deviance and marginality and sexual marginality. Films on biculturality and marginality experiences will be shown in the afternoon before Sadri's presentation.
