ENJOY A KALEIDOSCOPE OF MEMORIES DURING HOMECOMING

Homecoming is a time for alumni to revisit their alma mater, reunite with long-lost friends, see faculty and staff they remember, and catch up on details on the lives of former classmates. This year TWU's homecoming celebration, titled "Kaleidoscope of Memories," will offer those opportunities and more. The event will kick off at 10:30 a.m. on Thurs., April 24, with Honors Convocation in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Alumni and their guests are welcome to attend the presentation of the Cornaro and Lyon awards to faculty, the Award of Excellence and Outstanding Achievement Awards to staff and National Alumnae Association's Outstanding Senior and Graduate Student awards. The program will include an introduction of recipients of the 1997 TWU NAA Distinguished Alumnae Award.

Immediately following Honors Convocation, the All-University Picnic will be held at the Pioneer Woman circle. The picnic, compliments of the NAA, honors TWU's 1996-97 graduates. This event is an opportunity for alumni to meet faculty, staff and students.

A major highlight during homecoming will be the Golden Girls Dinner at 6:30 p.m. on Fri., April 25, in Hubbard Hall's southeast dining room. Alums from the class of 1947, as well as current TWU faculty and administrators, will model 38 original outfits designed especially for women who are 50 years of age and older. Dr. Sharon Underwood (fashion and textiles) and TWU fashion design majors created the ensembles. A service in the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods and a coffee hosted by Dr. Carol Surlles (president's office) on Sunday will conclude the week.

"ON MY OWN TIME" ENTRIES NEEDED

TWU faculty and staff are invited to participate in the university's annual "On My Own Time" employee arts and crafts exhibition, which will be displayed May 5-16, 1997, on ACT 2. The deadline for entries is on Fri., April 18, at 4 p.m. Original works of art are requested for the following categories: 1 -- painting; 2 -- drawing/graphics; 3 -- color photography; 4 -- black and white photography; 5 -- sculpture; 6 -- textile crafts; and 7 -- non-textile crafts.

A panel of judges will select the best in-house art during the week of May 5-10; these works will be exhibited in a city-wide show at the Center for the Visual Arts in June and July, which will be coordinated by the Greater Denton Arts Council.

Any TWU employee is eligible to enter the "On My Own Time" employee art exhibit. However, professional artists who work on campus may not enter work in those categories for which they are compensated or for which they teach. Other requirements are listed below.

- An entry must be the employee's original work.
- An entry must have been created on the artist's own time.
- An entry must have been created within the last three years.
- Work entered in previous "On My Own Time" exhibitions is not eligible.
- Only four entries per employee will be accepted.
- Each piece must be framed and/or ready for hanging or display. Pieces that do not meet this requirement will be disqualified.
- Kits will not be considered for the city exhibition but may be displayed at TWU's in-house show. They must be labeled "Kit" for the judges.
- Each entry must be labeled with the following information: a) employee's name; b) employee's department; c) art/craft category; d) title of work; and e) year of creation.

TWU winners whose works will be displayed in the city exhibit (June 23-July 25) must meet additional requirements:

- No more than two entries per artist will be selected for the city exhibition.
- Pieces selected for the city show must be delivered to the Greater Denton Arts Council by the exhibitor and must meet GDAC's deadline to be included in the exhibition.

DEVELOPMENT LEAVE AWARDS ANNOUNCED

The 1996-97 TWU faculty development leave committee, chaired by Dr. James Galloway (library), has announced that 14 faculty members have received development leave awards for 1997. "Awards are given for individual projects that promote faculty knowledge and skills for improved teaching, research and service capabilities," said Galloway. A total of \$10,500 was available; maximum awards were \$1,000 each. Funding for the awards is coordinated through the office of the vice president for academic affairs.

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HR CAN HELP WITH REFERENCE CHECKING FOR NEW HIRES

The department of human resources is able to provide a new service to departments by performing reference checks for applicants being considered for staff positions in Denton, Dallas and Houston below the level of director, according to Carri Stephens (human resources). "This service standardizes and enhances the consistency of obtaining background information about applicants prior to an offer of employment," said Stephens. "Human resources is in the process

of implementing this service with the division of finance and administration. If you would like to participate at this time, please contact our office.”

The process will include a reference check by the department of human resources after initial interviews have been conducted within individual departments. After the applicant pool is narrowed and one or more persons have been identified as finalists, the department should contact either Annette Johnson or Carlos Crenshaw in human resources, who will obtain reference information. Then a member of the human resources staff will report the results of the reference checks to the department, and HR will make the offer of employment when the hiring department has reached a decision. “A hiring department representative is welcome to be present when references are checked and can request specific information for verification,” added Stephens. Directed by Charles Harrill (performing arts, drama), the play opens with the two main characters on the road to Denmark, where they have been summoned by the newly-crowned king and Hamlet’s uncle/father, Claudius. Throughout the play, the men seek answers to what “...is known to them, but not unknowable...” (their roles in the grand scheme of things). That knowledge, however, continues to evade them and, through the end, they aren’t quite sure why their lives were all that important to anyone except themselves. In Stoppard’s hands, this classic tragedy in modern European fashion crosses into the realm of witty and wry comedy.

The cast includes: Chris Shelton and Chase Perrett as Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, respectively; the Player, by Patrick Watson; Paul Munson as Claudius; Susan Bryson as Gertrude; Mark Pimsler as Hamlet; Brie Scolaro as Ophelia; Jennifer Hutcheson as Polonius; court ladies-in-waiting by Stephanie Kopp and Fern Oquendo; Brian Shirey as Claudius’ body guard; and Niki Theriot as the court’s attendant lord.
