

ITS PROJECT EARNS INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION

The TWU office of information technology services has earned an international award for a workflow project that its employees designed this year, sharing top honors with organizations like Kraft Foods and the Screen Actor's Guild. Future Strategies, Inc., in cooperation with Giga Information Group and the Workflow and Re-Engineering International Association, named TWU a finalist in their 9th annual Awards of Excellence program. The award recognizes innovation, implementation and impact. The imaging and workflow project developed by TWU ITS and the controller's office is outlined in the publication titled *Excellence in Practice* by Lyna Fischer of Future Strategies, Inc. TWU was nominated for the award by Optika.

"I am extremely proud of the award that ITS staff members have earned with their imaging and workflow project," said Tom Graf (ITS). Imaging documents in the controller's office has increased efficiency and streamlined the workflow in that office -- the project that was designed by ITS in cooperation with the controller's office. "Congratulations to ITS! The recognition is well deserved," said Cori Trevino (controller's office). "The imaging workflow has improved the efficiency of our accounting and purchasing departments."

Two gold medals were awarded for workflow to Autogere of Portugal and Kraft Foods. Three silver medals went to the Korea Institute of Science and Technology, South Korea; ForeningsSparbanken AB, Sweden; and the Worker's Compensation Board, British Columbia. TWU was a finalist with several other organizations: Bank of America Capital Markets Operations; Blue Cross/Blue Shield of South Carolina; George Mason University; the government of New Brunswick; Kraft Foods; the Screen Actor's Guild; the Office of the U.S. Secretary of Defense; the University of South Florida; and Zurcher Kantonalbank, Switzerland.

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SECC CONTRIBUTIONS SET ANOTHER RECORD!

TWU's faculty and staff in Denton came through for the second consecutive year by contributing \$33,238.04 to the State Employee Charitable Campaign. The Denton SECC goal was \$30,000. Approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000 in contributions on TWU's behalf went directly to United Way of Denton County, signaling a total of almost \$40,000 for 1999-2000.

Lizabeth Elkins (institutional research and statistics) and Dr. Betty Adams (Nursing) delivered the news last week. "This year's SECC campaign was a record-setting year," said Adams. "We exceeded our contribution goal of \$30,000. However, we did not meet our participation goal of 50 percent. There is still time for employees to donate -- even a donation of \$2 will help increase our participation goal." Elkins added, "Thanks to all employees and SECC office coordinators for their support of this year's campaign. Anyone who has ideas or suggestions that will make next year's campaign even better should send them to us."

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GET SLAMMIN'!

TWU's English honor society -- the Beta Epsilon chapter of Sigma Tau Delta -- will host a poetry reading (or a poetry "slam!") on Wed., Nov. 17, from noon to 1 p.m. in the grassy area between CFO and ASB. The campus community and general public are invited to attend. The reading will celebrate 100 years of student creative writing as an early tribute to TWU's centennial.

During the event, 10 honor society students will read selections from TWU student creative writing journals dating back to the 1920s, accompanied by classical music played by members of the Denton High School orchestra. (The Beta Epsilon chapter at TWU has been on campus since 1946; it recognizes outstanding promise in the study of English.)

"We want to kick off the centennial early by recognizing the importance of creative writing by our students during the past century," said Heather Jensen, chapter president. "Poetry and prose reflect the heartbeat of this campus, and we are honored to bring back some of the voices from the past for even a little while. I hope that faculty, staff, students and others will take a moment out of their busy day to hear some really fine writing and to listen to some music." 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TWU CEMENTS RELATIONSHIP WITH LAREDO COMMUNITY

Several TWU representatives will visit Laredo on Nov. 29 to meet with Laredo Community College officials and students about articulation agreements and recruitment. 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PURCHASING CARD PROGRAM ORIENTATION SET

TWU is implementing a purchasing card program as authorized by the State of Texas General Services Commission through a contract with the Bank of America. This program is designed to delegate authority and capability to purchase low-value items directly to a specific account's manager. "Use of the purchasing card will significantly reduce the requirements to obtain purchase order numbers, process invoices for final payment and prepare large numbers of vouchers and payments," said Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration).

To receive a Bank of America MasterCard for these types of purchases, authorized individuals must attend a *mandatory* purchasing card orientation. The first orientation was held last Friday. 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STATUE RESTORATION UNDER WAY

TWU alumna Jo Roper is visiting the campus this week to work on restoration of the St. Francis of Assisi statue she was commissioned to create more than 40 years ago. Located near the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods, the statue -- which is cast in stone -- was dedicated on June 1, 1952, in memory of Bertha

Altizer Hubbard and in honor of Dr. L.H. Hubbard, TWU's president from 1926 to 1950. The statue was a gift from the TWU National Alumnae Association.

Time has taken its toll: the once life-like expression of St. Francis and the small bird in his tiny hand have eroded. "The statue has really suffered the effects of acid rain," said Roper. "No one knew enough about the effects of acid rain 50 years ago to occasionally wash the statue with soap and water."

Roper, who visits the campus annually, noticed last year that the small bird resting on St. Francis' hand was severely damaged -- its tiny head had eroded. She is preparing a wax mold to replace the original cast bird. "This new bird will be cast in bronze for the millennium," said Roper. "It's a mille-bird." The artist became involved in the 1952 campus project through friends in the department of visual arts. The project took two months to complete, but the restoration process will be shorter; the wax mold is almost complete and will be sent to a foundry for casting. "I see things in shapes," she added. "Sculpting -p; it's what I do. The Little Chapel and surrounding grounds are almost nicer than I remember."
